This Local Transport Plan has been prepared by the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority. Established in 2017 and led by Mayor James Palmer, we are investing in transport, infrastructure and skills to improve the lives of residents across our area.

What is a Local Transport Plan?

The Local Transport Plan sets out our longterm vision and strategy for transport in our area. It contains our priority schemes; provides a framework for assessing and prioritising future projects; and describes how smaller, more local transport schemes, will be delivered by local authorities. This is the first Local Transport Plan for the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority area, and we need your views to help shape our future transport system.


Our Priority Schemes







Long-term Strategy

Our long-term strategy is to deliver a Local Transport Plan that:

Supports growth and distribution of prosperity

It will contribute to meeting our ambitions for growth. In conjunction with the forthcoming Spatial Framework (non-statutory) and Local Industrial Strategy it sets out how we will respond to the challenges laid down in the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Independent Economic Review of growing and distributing our economic prosperity, in order to secure the future prosperity of all of our residents and businesses through improvements to strategic connectivity, especially north-south, and improvements to rural bus provision.

Focuses on people and public transport-centred planning and development

It will reduce the need to travel and encourage people to change their transport choices to more sustainable options. It will do this by providing sustainable, genuine alternatives to the private car.

Will help to reduce congestion

It will improve public transport, walking and cycling provision to existing communities, and support the creation of new economic centres by improving accessibility across the region.

Will achieve wider social and environmental objectives

It will support health and wellbeing; improved air quality and safety; social inclusion; protecting and enhancing our local environment; and working to tackle climate change.





Peterborough

Our strategy is focussed on improving access to the city centre, helping to promote jobs and housing growth.


It will improve the quality of spaces within the city centre, making it an easier place to access and travel through, and a more enjoyable space to spend time in.

- Improvements to our rail network, including improvements to the East Coast Main Line with faster, more frequent services to London, Leeds and Newcastle
- Better public realm and walking and cycling facilities, including in the City Centre and a new footbridge across the River Nene at Fletton Quays
- Better bus provision, such as more services at evenings and weekends, as outlined in the recent Strategic Bus Review
- Review of mass rapid transit options for Peterborough, including the potential extension of the Cambridgeshire Autonomous Metro [CAM] to Peterborough in the longer-term
- Delivering a more reliable road network, with continued junction improvements on the Parkway network and removal of the level crossing at Kings' Dyke

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Greater Cambridge


Sustainable transport is at the heart of our strategy.
We want more people walking, cycling and taking public transport for their journeys instead of their private car.
This will support improved health and wellbeing, air quality and social inclusion, while tackling climate change and delivering a more integrated, accessible transport system.



- Cambridgeshire Autonomous Metro [CAM]
 a new 'metro-style' system connecting the city
 of Cambridge with the surrounding region with
 reliable, high-frequency services unaffected by
 traffic congestion
- Comprehensive, high-quality Dutch-standard walking and cycling infrastructure to make walking and cycling a safe, attractive option for all
- Better bus services, with more reliable, frequent services including at evenings and weekends, as outlined in the recently published Strategic Bus Review
- Improving our rail network, with a new station at Cambridge South to serve the rapidly growing Biomedical Campus, and more frequent services to Stansted, Peterborough, Newmarket and Norwich
- Exploring highway demand management in collaboration with the Greater Cambridge Partnership, including introducing parking controls, variable charging and/or physical restrictions on traffic to free up road space, reduce congestion, fund better public transport, and improve air quality

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
Huntingdonshire

Our strategy aims to support growth in Huntingdonshire and Alconbury Weald. It will allow the development of new housing and employment sites, and improve the transport network for those who already live in the area.

- Better connectivity to Peterborough,
 Cambridge and the rest of the region,
 including new CAM services from St Ives to
 Cambridge (with potential for future extension
 to Huntingdon and Alconbury Weald), faster,
 more frequent services along the East Coast
 Main Line, and the dualling of the A428
 between Black Cat and Caxton Gibbett with
 potential for future extension to St Neots,
 Huntingdon and Alconbury Weald
- Improved bus links, targeted at supporting new development, including high-quality bus corridors linking St Ives to Huntingdon and the Alconbury Weald travel hub
- A new foot and cycle bridge in St Neots, as part of a wider package of town centre improvements
- Better rural bus services, following the recommendations of the recently published Strategic Bus Review
- Encouraging freight traffic away from rural communities
- Continued feasibility work into the potential for a third river crossing in Huntington

East Cambridgeshire


Improved accessibility
to, from and within East
Cambridgeshire is central to
our strategy, which will help
to make the district a more
attractive place to live, work,
and do business.

- Better connectivity into Greater Cambridge via a CAM route extending to Mildenhall
- Improvements to Ely Station and adjacent rail junctions, enabling more frequent services to Cambridge, Peterborough, Norfolk and Suffolk
- Construction of a new railway station at Soham, helping to draw jobs and investment into the area and connect local residents to the wider rail network
- Providing better walking and cycling infrastructureto make it easier and safer for residents to travel on foot or by bike
- Dualling of the A10 from Ely to Cambridge, providing more capacity to help relieve congestion on a section of road which currently sees regular, significant disruption

Fenland


Improved accessibility to, from and within Fenland is central to our strategy, helping to make Fenland a more attractive place to live, work, and do business.



- Construction of the Wisbech Rail Link to March, significantly improving access to the town from the rest of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, directly connecting residents to Cambridge in approximately 45 minutes
- More frequent rail services between Fenland, Cambridge and Peterborough, improving north-south connectivity, supported by station improvements at March, Whittlesea and Manea
- Continued investment in improved walking and cycling infrastructure to make walking and cycling a safer, more attractive choice for residents, attracting them away from their cars for short trips
- Better rural bus services will be provided, in line with the recommendations of the recently published Strategic Bus Review
- Major improvements to our highway network, including dualling of all the A47 in Cambridgeshire, helping to attract greater investment to Fenland
- Local junction and highway improvements in Wisbech, improving local connectivity and supporting the development of a potential Garden Town








How can you get involved?
